TOWN NEWS - FRATERNITIES TO BE TRIED ON FURNISHING TO MINORS CHARGES

In a move surprising many in the PSU community, the State College Police brought charges in December against 16 University fraternities for furnishing alcohol to minors. The charges resulted from an undercover operation in which police officers entered random fraternity parties, identified themselves as students, drank beer, and observed people drinking

whom the officers believed to be minors. The officers then followed these alleged underage drinkers outside, where a uniformed officer waited to stop them and request that they provide identification and proof of age. Those who were underage were issued a citation, and the fraternity house where they had been served was noted. Following a two-month investigation of this nature, 16 fraternities were all charged on the same date early in December 1986.

There is a wide variety of opinion concerning this crackdown by the police on the fraternities. The Interfraternity Council (IFC) has condemned the operation, calling it a breach of trust between the Borough of State College and the Greeks. IFC President and S&B brother Pat Conway (Spring '86) noted that "the IFC is totally re-evaluating its relationship with the borough", calling the investigation a "sting". The fraternities felt that they were double-crossed by the borough, after making great efforts to curb underage drinking and instituting a Neighborhood Watch program to cut down on vandalism and other crime in the areas surrounding fraternity houses. Some members of the Undergraduate Student Government, including President and S&B brother Matt Baker (Fall '86) have supported IFC in this matter, calling for a strong stand to be taken against the borough to stress the importance of students in the community.

On the other side of the issue, the State College Police point out that they were simply responding to the concerns of area residents that something be done about underage drinking in the borough, especially among area high school students. When fraternities were entered, it was with the expectation of finding alcohol being served to State College teenagers. Although not one high school student was identified, underage drinking was still taking place and the law is the law. State College Borough Council member Mary Ann Haas is in agreement with this position, stating that fraternity members "are residents of the borough and have the same legal rights and privileges, but no more" as all other borough residents. She further added that while the borough is grateful for all that various students groups do for the community, "that doesn't give them the right to do anything they want".

The University has remained out of the discussion, following the implementation of its new alcohol policy at the end of Spring semester last year. This policy stated that the University does not have the legal responsibility to enforce alcohol rules off campus, seeing this enforcement as a community responsibility. Assistant Vice President for Student Programs, Tom Eakin (S&B Honorary, Spring '84) feels the police were justified in their investigation. Eakin noted that although the University realizes "that IFC has really worked very hard at making progress, obviously they haven't made all the progress they need to make".

The two sides met in court at a preliminary hearing on January 21, 1987 to determine if sufficient evidence existed to bring the fraternities to trial. Following a five-hour hearing, 14 fraternities entered a plea of not guilty and were held over for trial. Twelve houses had been charged as a result of the undercover investigation, while three other cases (including one against a house also charged in the investigation), stemmed from unrelated complaints. One fraternity, Sigma Tau Gamma, pleaded guilty to furnishing alcohol to minors, while charges were dropped against two others Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Sigma Nu, due to insufficient evidence. Fraternities awaiting trial are: Acacia, Alpha Chi Rho, Alpha Epsilon Pi, Beta Sigma Beta, Theta Delta Chi, Kappa Sigma, Pi Kappa Alpha, Pi Lambda Phi, Sigma Pi, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Tau Kappa Epsilon, Phi Kappa Theta, Phi Kappa Tau, and Phi Mu Delta.

The fourteen fraternities, all represented by the firm of James Jubelirer and Associates, will be tried separately in April at the Centre County courthouse in Bellefonte. The major thrust of the defense, according

to their attorney Edward Blanarik, will be to address several suspected violations of Constitutional rights. Blanarik said Fourth Amendment rights providing against unreasonable search and seizure were violated by police when they entered the fraternity houses without probable cause or search warrants. Rights were also violated when party guests were stopped by uniformed officers outside the houses and asked to present identification without probable cause. Officers outside the house did not observe the guests consuming alcohol inside the house, and therefore had no cause to detain them outside of the house and request identification. Problems in this defense could arise if the court deems a fraternity house to be a public structure rather than a private residence. Precedents exist supporting both definitions.

The defense gained some ammunition when it was revealed during the preliminary hearing that the undercover officers, while following alleged underage drinkers, had carried cups of beer outdoors thus violating the borough's open container ordinance. State College Police Chief Elwood Williams said he was unaware of this infraction prior to the hearing, but added "I don't think we want to get into running a police department violates the law in order to enforce the law." However, "I think this thing is being beat to death, the key is to make people understand that underage drinking and serving alcohol (to minors) are crimes so that we don't have to make any more of these types investigations."

So the controversy continues. IFC has recommended increased vigilance at fraternity social events. The State College Police have indicated that they intend to conduct similar investigations throughout the borough, including parties in off-campus apartments and homes shared by students, to enforce alcohol regulations. We'll keep you informed of this situation as it unfolds.
