FRATERNITIES CONVICTED OF SERVING ALCOHOL TO MINORS

Here is the follow up to the story in the Feb. '87 S&B Newsletter:

In April 1987 the 12 fraternities charged with serving alcohol to minors following a State College police undercover investigation last October failed in their attempt to have the case and the evidence thrown out. The fraternities charged are Acacia, Alpha Chi Rho, Alpha Epsilon Pi, Beta Sigma Beta, Phi Kappa Tau, Phi Kappa Theta, Phi Mu Delta, Pi Kappa Alpha, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Pi, Tau Kappa Epsilon, and Theta Delta Chi.

Defense Attorney Edward Blanarik called the investigation "an act of lawlessness that could be elevated to police vigilantism". He told the court that the investigations were improper because no search warrants were obtained and there was no reason to suspect criminal activity at the individual fraternities. Therefore, all evidence obtained from the investigations should be suppressed.

Assistant District Attorney Mark Smith replied that search warrants were not required because there was an "open invitation" for the officers to enter the fraternities. Smith added that general complaints about fraternities as a whole were sufficient cause for investigation. State College residents had been complaining about underage drinking, especially among high school students; vandalism; and drunk driving.

Centre County Court Judge David Grine heard testimony from State College Police Officer Lori Hazenstab, who went undercover as a student in the

investigation; the presidents of three of the 12 fraternities charged; and IFC President Pat Conway.

Conway told the court that PSU fraternities had already instituted policies on their own to ease community concerns when police conducted their investigations. Fraternities started alcohol awareness programs for new members, had begun checking for identification to ensure that only college students could enter fraternity functions, required the availability of an alternative beverage at all functions, and established an Alcohol Policy Resolution Committee to discuss further changes.

Smith asked Conway whether minors, once admitted, could still obtain alcohol at fraternity events. Conway replied, "At some functions, yes." Judge Grine concluded that enough evidence existed to hold the case for a jury trial in May.

At the trial, on May 10, eighteen minors testified they were given what they believed to be beer at 12 Penn State fraternities. But under I cross examination, the witnesses said they could not determine the alcoholic content of the beverage.

Officer Lori Hazenstab testified that she and Officer Ann Henry posing as students, entered fraternities that had a great amount of activity. Once inside, the officers observed guests who appeared to be minors who were served what appeared to be alcoholic beverages. The officers tasted beer from the bar, but didn't have any drinks tested for alcohol content.

When the suspected minor left the party, one officer left with the minor and radioed to a uniformed officer who checked the minor's age. The minors were sent a citation for underage drinking.

The minors testified that Henry and Hazenstab approached them outside the fraternities, said they were from out of town and asked for directions. Hazenstab and Henry did not at any time identify themselves as police officers because "it could have ruined the case".

After two days of testimony, prosecutor Smith addressed the jury of seven women and five men, "Teamed up with all the evidence and your common sense, I ask that you return a verdict of guilty".

On May 12, after deliberating for less than half an hour, the jury found 11 out of 12 fraternities guilty of serving alcohol to minors. Sigma Phi Epsilon was found not guilty after minors testified that they didn't receive beer at the fraternity.

Furnishing alcohol to minors, a misdemeanor charge, carries a fine of \$100 to \$500 for first-time offenders, Judge Grine said. A one- to three-month prison term would be imposed if the fine is not paid.

In addition to the 12 fraternities listed above, Kappa Sigma and Pi Lambda Phi were scheduled for trial on May 15 and May 21, respectively. These fraternities were charged after police stopped a minor for public drunkenness and another for violating the open-container ordinance. Both fraternities were found not guilty.

Defense Attorney Edward Blanarik filed a motion requesting a new trial in Centre County for the 11 convicted fraternities. If the motion is denied, the fraternities can appeal the conviction to the state Superior Court once they are sentenced.

We'll update you on this situation in our next newsletter.
